

BOOK GROUP 1



Darrow designed this version of the game after losing his job in the stock market crash of 1929 - the earliest known version of Monopoly, known as The Landlord's Game, was designed by an American, Elizabeth Magie, and first patented in 1904 but existed as early as 1902.

Then, on this watery thoroughfare, horses strained to pull lighters, laden and brimmed with wares of coal and reel and spool.



The company first became profitable in 2019, and completed an initial public offering that year. The company joined the NASDAQ-100 stock index on April 30, 2020.
