# **VALENTINE HODGES, BEEKEEPER**



# 24 September 2020 Meeting

Valentine Hodges was our speaker; she has Loughshore Apiary in Co Down, Northern Ireland, with apiaries located across the Ards Peninsula, including one at Mount Stewart. Valentine's focus is on the native Irish black bee, which is in decline, and needs all the help and support that can be mustered. She gave an absorbing talk about her introduction to beekeeping and how she's built her apiary. This included a fascinating history of honey and bees wax, some found in the tombs of the pharaohs was over 3000 years old and still edible. She told us that all honey can produce hydrogen peroxide, which fights bacteria and has powerful antiseptic properties.

Bees love Cornflowers, Dandelions and Oxeye Daisies to name a few. Monofloral honey is a type of honey which has a distinctive flavour or other attribute due to its being predominantly from the nectar of one plant species. Manuka honey is an example, and VeesBees provides a medicinal monofloral honey made from ivy flowers. Valentine also talked about "Confessions of a Bad

Honey Bee Bumble Bee Hornet Wasp

Beekeeper: What Not to Do When Keeping Bees (with Apologies to My Own)" by Bill Turnbull, and mentioned his visit to Northern Ireland. Another interesting fact was that bees react to pheromones - bees give off smells like geraniums, but the attack pheromone smells like pear or lemon or bananas drops, so don't eat bananas when around bees! Bees will fly around your face to smell your breath and they recognise facial patterns.

VeesBees produce a range of natural skin care products using ingredients from their bees; products that include moisturisers, body butters and lip balms, and of course pure honey. Loughshore Apiary aims to use the profits from their products to provide funding that will help improve the bee's habitat. http://www.veesbees.com.

Do you remember the excitement you felt as a child, when you received some post, when your mother or father called out that you had a letter? The mad scramble to the front door, being handed the envelope, turning it over and over to see if you might get a hint of the sender? The careful opening of it to avoid tearing the contents, and the quick perusal of all sides of the page(s) to satisfy your intense curiosity about who had sent it, what it was about, where it was from, when it was posted and why it was sent to you!

When I was a child, I lived in a logging camp in British Columbia, Canada for six years. The only way in or out was

by boat or floatplane. The floatplanes ferrying people (logging crews and non-logging civilians) in and out would land on a glacial lake named Phillips Lake. All our food, supplies and mail would come by Union Steamship into <a href="Phillips Arm">Phillips Arm</a>. Our postal address was simply "Name, c/o VanDan Logging, Via String Mail Bag, Phillips Arm, BC."

Once a week on "Mail Day" our tugboat would take an empty barge out into the Arm and load cargo from the ship, bringing it back to the boat shed, where it would be off-loaded into a truck and driven the 2 miles to the camp. It was a big job, and very exciting for everyone, but especially for the six children residing there, and letters and parcels from civilization were eagerly awaited.

Now everything seems to come by email: bank statements, family updates, utility bills, even Christmas cards! Who would have imagined in the 1970s or even the 1980s such a drastic change? But there are still many of us who do not live with computers and

smartphones, who are not digitally connected 24 hours a day. Some of us still enjoy the post, sorting the bills and letters and magazines, and even greeting cards – actual paper!



Two things happened recently that brought this home to me. One was a lovely phone call from Catherine Murdoch asking my opinion about starting a group for Pen Pals! I think it's a great idea, and await her written description of how the group will work, which she is sending to me by Royal Mail.

The other coincidental happening was a <u>Facebook post</u> which made me think at the time that we need to pay even more attention to ensure that everyone is able to communicate in ways with which they are comfortable. We mail paper copies of the newsletter to those that request it, but maybe we need to do more? If you know of someone that is not "connected" please let the committee know so that we can take steps to ensure that person is included in other ways. We all need to do our part in these unusual times.


