'OUT & ABOUT IN LISBURN WITH THE BIRDS' - DOT BLAKELY

At our 29th April meeting, Dot Blakely, a regular on BBC Radio Ulster's 'Your Place & Mine', brought us 'Out & About in Lisburn with the Birds'. We saw and heard birds at the river Lagan, Castle Gardens, Longstone Street Roundabout, Chapel Hill, Wallace Park, Island Centre, Bow Street, Linen Museum, and Market Square. Birds included blackbird, wren, tree-creeper, chaffinch, long-tailed tit, robin, goldfinch, sparrow, great-tit, chiffchaff, duck, grey-wagtail, heron, pied wagtail, gull, pigeon, blue-tit, and starling. Who knew there were so many different birds in Lisburn?

Who knew that the hole in a blue-tit nest box should be no more than 25mm to prevent great-tits entering? Who knew that the goldcrest is the smallest bird? Most people think it's the wren.

Dot emphasised the importance of bio-diversity for our birds as they need a variety of nesting and feeding sites. They need things we often remove, such as brambles, ivy, dandelions, moss, lichen, and spider's webs. She advised us to feed the birds in winter but gradually reduce feeding in spring as nature's food sources - insects, seeds, berries etc start to reappear. Dot is passionate about birds and has amassed a vast amount of knowledge over the past 30 years. She shared her knowledge generously and hopefully inspired us to a greater appreciation of our feathered friends. "THE STORY OF THE DONEGAL SPITFIRE"

Our guest speaker on the afternoon will be **Jonny McNee** who will give a talk describing the fascinating events behind his discovery and excavation in 2011 of Pilot Officer Roland 'Bud' Wolfe's Spitfire P8074 from deep beneath the peat on the Glenshinny mountain, Inishowen Peninsula, Co Donegal.


This aircraft served with 133 (Eagle) Squadron RAF in mid-1941 who were based for a short period of time at RAF Eglinton – now the City of Derry Airport.



The iconic fighter's war time donation by successful Canadian businessman Garfield Weston, its incredible state of preservation and the firing of one of its recovered Browning machine guns — watched by over a million people on the BBC website - catapulted the P8074 story onto a global stage. The tracing of the pilot's family in the US will also be weaved into the

story.

The discovery and excavation of Spitfire P8074 was recorded as part of the groundbreaking BBC NI series 'Dig WW2' first broadcast in Spring 2012. Information abut his book 'The Story of the Donegal Spitfire' is available from Jonny at

hard to believe some of the incidents related in it but maybe this is the case with all "factional" books and films.


This month's book is "Pachinko" by Min Jin Lee which is set in Korea which should be as far away from the Royal Family as we can possibly go but we will let you know.

ANTIQUES & COLLECTABLES

COLLECTING PERFUME BOTTLES

Perfume bottles are a tradition that can be traced back all the way to the Golden Age of the Roman and Egyptian Empires. Bottles made from a range of ceramic, glass and metal materials remained popular throughout Europe during the Middle Ages. Later Edwardian perfume bottles were often constructed entirely of metal, often silver or gold, and featured ornate engravings. Later still, Victorian perfume bottles employed even simpler glass designs and predominantly silver caps.







The oldest of these antiquities are very rare and are not only collected by individuals, but by museums and anthropologists alike. That doesn't mean you can't set your sights on making one of these relics your very own!!

Collecting old perfume bottles is a great hobby and you can get an idea of how much a bottle is worth by considering these factors:

- The Age of the Bottle While not all old bottles are valuable, an older bottle is more likely to be worth more than a newer one.
- Seams and pontil marks are two of the ways you can determine a bottle's age. The pontil mark is the mark at the bottom of the bottle where it was attached to the glass blower's pontil rod. You can tell the difference between a machine-made bottle (1914 onwards) and a handmade bottle by carefully checking the seam line. The seam on a machine made bottle will run all the way up the bottle and over the lip.
- Condition, colour, and type of bottle are also important along with design, rarity, and general appeal.

Have a look among your 'treasures' – you probably have at least one!

Tuesday – the guy who walks three dogs around the loop, always does it anti-clockwise on Tuesdays...no idea why, but suspect he is part of some ancient Druid sect and does it to appease the Gods, like they did at Stonehenge. I don't live far from the Giants Ring where I understand strange things happen too.

Wednesday – shopping day... lady opposite always shops on Wednesdays.

Local Tesco has introduced a 'one way' shopping system with arrows and signs stuck to the floor. I caused mayhem when I doubled back to get a bottle of fake tan. Was chastised by a supervisor! So embarrassed, when two minutes later a voice on the tannoy reminded shoppers to stick to the one-way system or be ejected! Totally mortified... wish I'd been wearing a face mask so no one could recognise me.

Thursday – it's easy because people go out clapping for NHS at 8 pm.

produced a bodhran and starts tapping out, Are Ye Right There Michael Are Ye Right.

Not to be outdone, the guy opposite appears with a Lambeg Drum, and proceeds to beat the hell out of it! I'm sure every nurse and doctor in Belfast heard him!

I ring four of them each day just to remind them that my birthday is coming up

So, not to be outdone, I got a Pyrex dish and a potato masher and beat out Come Back Paddy Riley to Ballyjamesduff. In my exuberance, I knocked a hole in my good Pyrex dish, a wedding present from many moons ago.

Friday – the next-door neighbour gets his groceries delivered every Friday from Iceland. Over the fence, he voiced concern about his shopping being contaminated. I advised him to run a bath, add some Jeyes Fluid and gently wash the groceries.

An hour later, he saw me in the back garden and told me he had tried my idea. Sadly, the ice cream and frozen chips had melted, his bread was sodden, and toilet rolls totally unusable.

Suggested to him that maybe the water was too hot.

He flew into a rage and reached for a spade... warned him to keep 2 metre distance!

Saturday – I have a list of names, about 50, comprising siblings, relatives, and friends and I ring four of them each day - just to remind them that my birthday is coming up, or that they never returned the shovel they borrowed a year ago. But on Saturdays, I always phone my siblings - to their landlines, because it's cheaper and my siblings would talk for hours. After five weeks, I find I'm phoning people for the 2nd and 3rd time and it's difficult to find something new to talk about. Twice today I almost said 'Sorry, I have to run' before realising there is nowhere to run to!

Sunday – my internet Mass Online App reminds me it's Sunday. And I can have a lie in because I have a choice of about 200 Masses worldwide from Abu-Dhabi at 3:30am to Pope Francis at 6am, or Termonfeckin at 10 am and Baltimore at 10:30. The great thing about attending Sunday Service online, is that you can nip out to the kitchen for a coffee or a glass of wine during the sermon and secondly, they don't take up a collection! Getting to like this.
